

CEDAR CITY'S RAILROAD CENTENNIAL

This June will mark 100 years since the railroad came to Cedar City and our Historic Preservation Commission is planning a week-long celebration to commemorate the impact the train has made on our tourism, commerce, and agriculture industries. To this day, the railroad continues to be an important asset and economic driver for us and the businesses that are seeking a centralized location in the southwestern United States. Our upcoming celebration will take place June 19-24th, 2023, and will feature something special every day for everyone, whether you are a history buff or just looking for something fun to do as a family. Notice of Election: Three (3) City Council seats opening in 2023

Notice is hereby given that Cedar City will hold a 2023 municipal election to elect four-year terms for the following: three (3) Council Members.

Given a sufficient number of candidates, a primary election will be held August 15, 2023, with the municipal general election being held on November 7, 2023.

QUALIFICATIONS TO BE A MUNICIPAL CANDIDATE (Utah Code §10-3-301, Utah Code §20A-9-203)

- Registered voter in the municipality in which the individual is elected*
- Must have resided within the municipality for which the candidate is seeking office for the 12 consecutive months immediately before the date of the election.
- Maintain a principal place of residence within the municipality.
- If the individual resides in a territory which was annexed into the municipality: must have resided within the annexed territory or the municipality the 12 consecutive months immediately before the date of the election.
- Pay filing fee, if one is required by municipal ordinance
- Not convicted of a felony, treason, or crime relating to

elections*

- Cannot have been declared mentally incompetent
- * Utah Code §20A-2-101 states: A registered voter (1) is a citizen of the United States; (2) is a resident of Utah; (3) will, on the date of that election, be at least 18 years old, (4) has been a resident of Utah for 30 days immediately before that election; (5) and is registered to vote.
- ** Utah Code §20A-2-101.5 states: A person convicted of a felony loses the right to hold office until (1) all felony convictions have been expunged, OR (2) ten years have passed since the most recent felony conviction AND the person has paid all court-ordered restitution and fines AND the person has completed probation, been granted parole, or completed the term of incarceration associated with the felony.

The filing period is during regular office hours (Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.) June 1 through June 7, 2023.

All candidates for election are subject to campaign financial statement disclosure regulations. A qualified candidate may file a Declaration of Candidacy with the City Recorder, 10 North Main Street, Cedar City.



ANNUAL IRRIGATION RESTRICTIONS BEGINNING **APRIL 1, 2023**

Per City Ordinance 37-7.1, water restrictions on irrigating with culinary water between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. go into effect on April 1st, 2023 and will continue through October 31st, 2023.

This restriction is enforced every day of the week to conserve our water during the warmer months. Failure to comply will result in violations:

- **1. 1st violation** Warning.
- 2. 2nd violation Water supply shut off and \$25.00 reconnection fee.
- **3. 3rd violation** Water supply shut off, \$25.00 reconnectioin fee, and \$100.00 penalty.

All fines and penalties shall be paid in full prior to the restoration of water service.

Please be mindful of conserving our water resources. For more information on water conservation, visit www.conservewater.utah.gov.

If you would like to have your water meter turned off before you turn on the Stop-and-Waste sprinkler system, please contact Public Works at (435) 568-2912.

Please do not go into your meter barrel by yourself. The meter must be turned off and on by an authorized city water division employee.

As a reminder, last year a tiered water rate structure was approved

through 2025 and on July 1st, 2023, a new rate will be introduced based on water usage.

Iron Springs Inland Port to Bring New Investment & Employment

As Cedar City celebrates a century since the arrival of the Union Pacific Railroad in our community, we reflect on the tremendous impact this valuable asset has had on our community and our economy for a hundred years. The coming of the railroad forever changed Cedar City's economy and its character, and it continues to be a major factor to our economy. The creation this month of Utah's first rural inland port once again puts the economic spotlight on Cedar City's railroad connection.

The arrival of the Union Pacific initially boosted the local iron ore and livestock industries, and it greatly contributed to the expansion of the tourism industry in southern Utah. In addition to constructing the depot, the Union Pacific Railroad became fully involved in the tourist industry by purchasing hotels, buses, and building lodges at Zion, Bryce Canyon and Grand Canyon National Parks.

While the railroad's tie to tourism was replaced mainly by automobile travel, our local economy continues to rely heavily on the railroad. Today, a dozen manufacturing companies are directly connected to the railroad and trains supply raw materials that are processed into numerous products then shipped by truck throughout the western U.S.

Our connection to the rail and our location within one day's trucking to seaports and the west's largest markets, have been key to successful mining and manufacturing development in Cedar City. GOEX and American Packaging are the newest members of our manufacturing community. Both of these

companies chose Cedar City largely due to these factors. The newly announced Utah Inland Port project area includes nearly 1,000 acres of industrial property just west of Cedar City. New development in the new Inland Port project area will include BZI Steel's 820-acre Commerce Crossroads Logistics Park, including a new trans loading facility that will be operated by RailSync, a subsidiary of BZI.

Additionally, Savage Services, which operates 50 trans loading facilities throughout North America will build Savage Railport – Southern Utah on 74 acres.

These two facilities will allow companies that are not connected to the rail to load materials and products onto and off of rail cars, which will greatly increase the value of our railroad asset throughout the entire region. Instead of limiting rail service only to those companies connected to the rail, many businesses from throughout southwestern Utah will now benefit from this service.

The creation of the Iron Springs Inland Port as part of the statewide Utah Inland Port system will help fund and support these new developments and will help attract new industry to the community.

The industrial and manufacturing sector currently employs one in ten of Iron County workers and is one of the highest paying sectors in our economy. A major purpose of this Inland Port project area is to provide solid employment opportunities for our own children and our rapidly growing population.
